	In April and May, East Texas experienced heavy rainfall, leading to flooding along the San Jacinto and Trinity Rivers. Our members helped residents of Walker, Montgomery, Liberty, and Harris County with their recovery. The TGCRVOAD also helped coordinated the response in Trinity, Polk, and San Jacinto County, which did not have a VOAD. Responding to a disaster across more than 200 miles of riverfront? Challenging.
	In mid-May, a Derecho surprised all of us, causing significant damage across over 700 square miles and knocking out electricity for 1 million Houstonians. The volume of vegetative debris spread over such a wide area? Challenging.
	In July, Hurricane Beryl came ashore in Matagorda County. It left our counties a little more than half a day later, leaving more downed trees and damaged roofs, three million without power, and the challenges of keeping reasonably cool while July heat indices soared to triple digits. Challenging-cubed.
	I am proud of the way TGCRVOAD responded to the challenges. We exercised the four Cs of cooperation, communication, coordination, and collaboration and assisted a great number of our neighbors. Some of our preparations and training worked very well. However, the disasters were not exactly like the Harvey flooding that we learned from and trained for reminding us that every disaster has unique challenges.
	It reminds us that we need to be always flexible – like Gumby.
	It also reminds us that after every response, we have an opportunity to recognize what we did right and celebrate it, as well as identify areas for improvement to face challenges and prepare for the next opportunity.
	In our September meeting, we'll focus on both as we gently remind ourselves that 2024 is not over.

A Message from Connective

Thank you for your continued support as our community recovers from Hurricane Beryl, the May storms, and the Derecho. As you know, after disasters we deploy the Connective Survey in collaboration with Harris County OEM, Harris County LTRC, and the Texas Gulf Coast Regional VOAD to accurately assess postdisaster needs. Following Hurricane Beryl, we received nearly 7,500 unique responses, which highlights are available on <u>this</u> <u>dashboard</u>.

Since July, we have sent over 20 texts to survey respondents, providing information about cooling centers and shelters, food aid, cleanup and debris removal, and disaster and financial assistance as it becomes available. We currently have over 50,000 subscribers to Connective Texts and are continually sourcing relevant, targeted resources to share with them.
