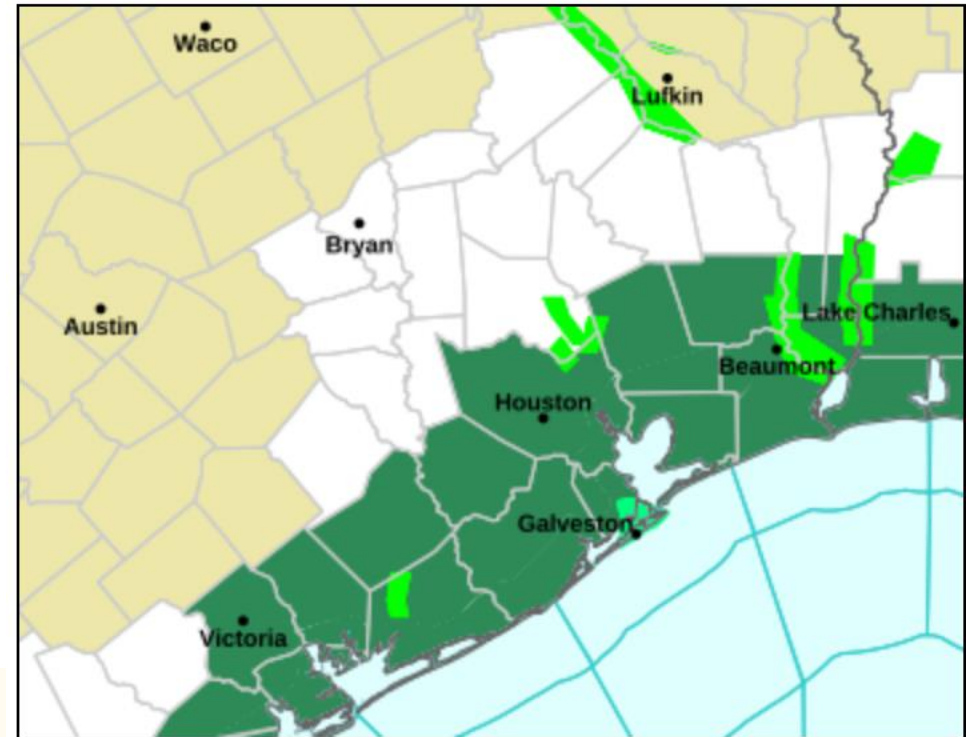

IMPACTS AND ACTIONS

- Excessive runoff may result in flooding of rivers, creeks, streams, and other low-lying and flood-prone locations, particularly urban areas.
- Monitor latest forecast updates and be prepared.
- Keep storm drains clear of debris.

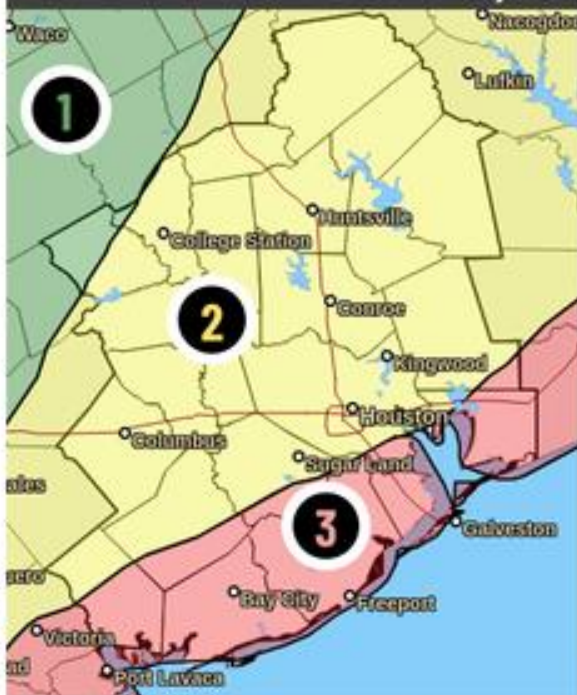


Moderate to Heavy Rain Today

OVERVIEW

- Another round of showers and storms to develop today.
- Rain could become heavy...with several inches falling in a localized area in a short time period.
- The potential for flooding remains a concern.
- There is a **Moderate Risk** (level 3 of 4) of Excessive Rainfall for coastal counties along the upper Texas coast.

ADDITIONAL RAINFALL TOTALS

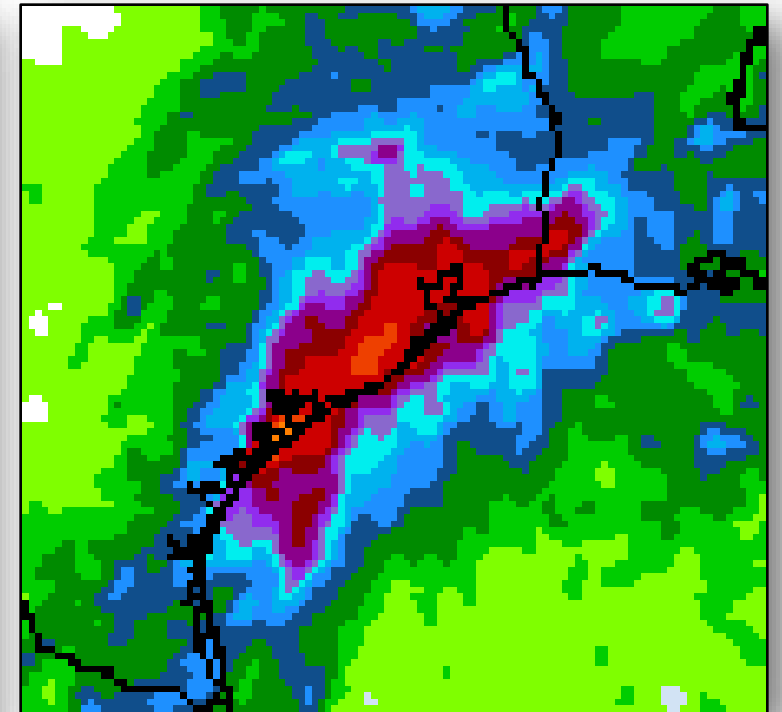
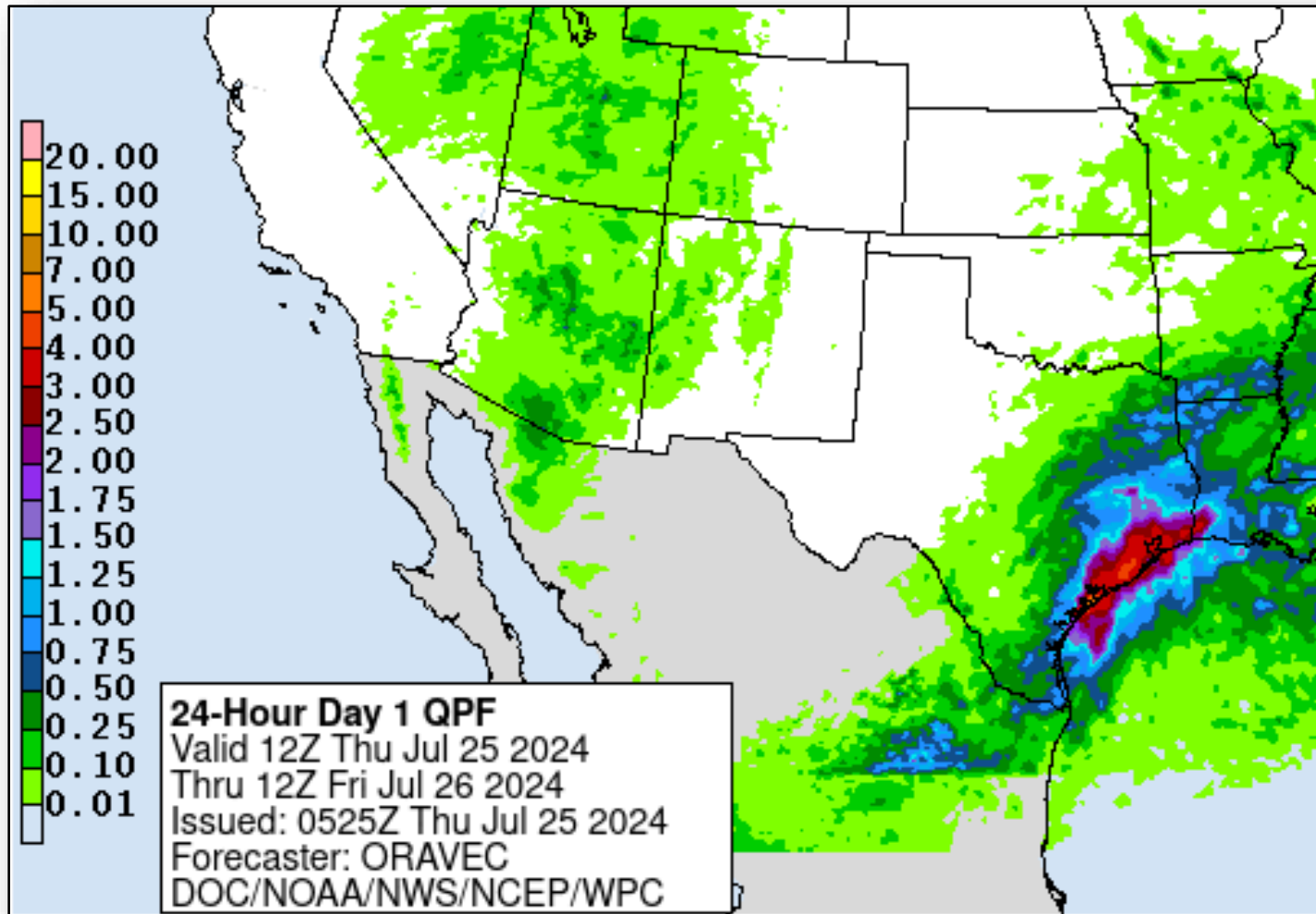
- Additional rainfall totals of **3-6"** are possible along the immediate coast, **2-4"** up to about Interstate 10. Locally higher amounts are possible.
- Totals between 0.25-1.5" should be common further inland.
- It should be emphasized that should the axis of heaviest rain set up just slightly further north, it would put the Houston metro area in a more impactful situation!

IMPACTS & ACTIONS

- Minor to moderate urban and small stream flooding (highest risk near the coast).
- Rises on rivers/watersheds...some above flood stage. San Jacinto, San Bernard, Trinity watersheds will be closely watched.
- If still dealing with debris from Beryl, please keep storm drains cleared so the rainfall can drain.
- Do not drive through flooded areas!

Stage 1	Nuisance street flooding , frontage road flooding, some minor impacts in a few locations	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Jan 2017 street flooding • May 2018 flooding in Harris, southern Montgomery counties
Stage 2	Flash flooding with mostly localized impacts (i.e., just Sugar Land, or Katy, or The Woodlands)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 2015 Halloween floods • May 2019 floods in Sugar Land and Kingwood
Stage 3	Significant flash flooding ; 100s of homes flooded; high impact timing (rush hour) or longer-duration flooding (Brazos, San Jacinto)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 2016 Memorial Weekend floods • 2009 April W. Houston flooding • T.S. Imelda (Houston)
Stage 4	Significant urban and suburban flooding with widespread effects; thousands of homes flooded, may shut down city for day	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 2015 Memorial Day floods • 2016 Tax Day floods • 1994 mid-October floods
Stage 5	Major urban and suburban flooding ; tens to hundreds of thousands of homes flooded, likely shuts down city for multiple days	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hurricane Harvey • T. S. Allison • T. S. Imelda (Beaumont)

Note: This scale seeks to generalize regional effects. If you did not flood during a previous Stage 4 or 5 event, you may still flood in future Stage 4 or 5 events, or even lesser ones.

- Expect more rain in Houston due to low pressure and moisture.
- **Stage 2 flood alert for coastal counties.**
- **Stage 1 flood alert for inland areas, including Harris County.**
- Weather should improve by Friday and into the weekend.
- Sunny next week.

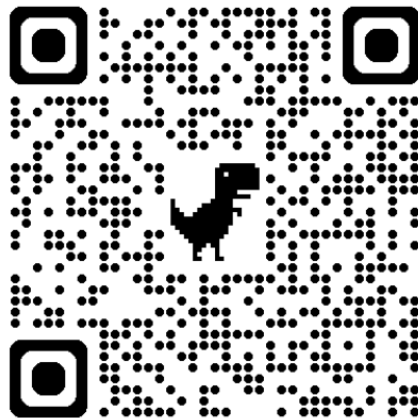

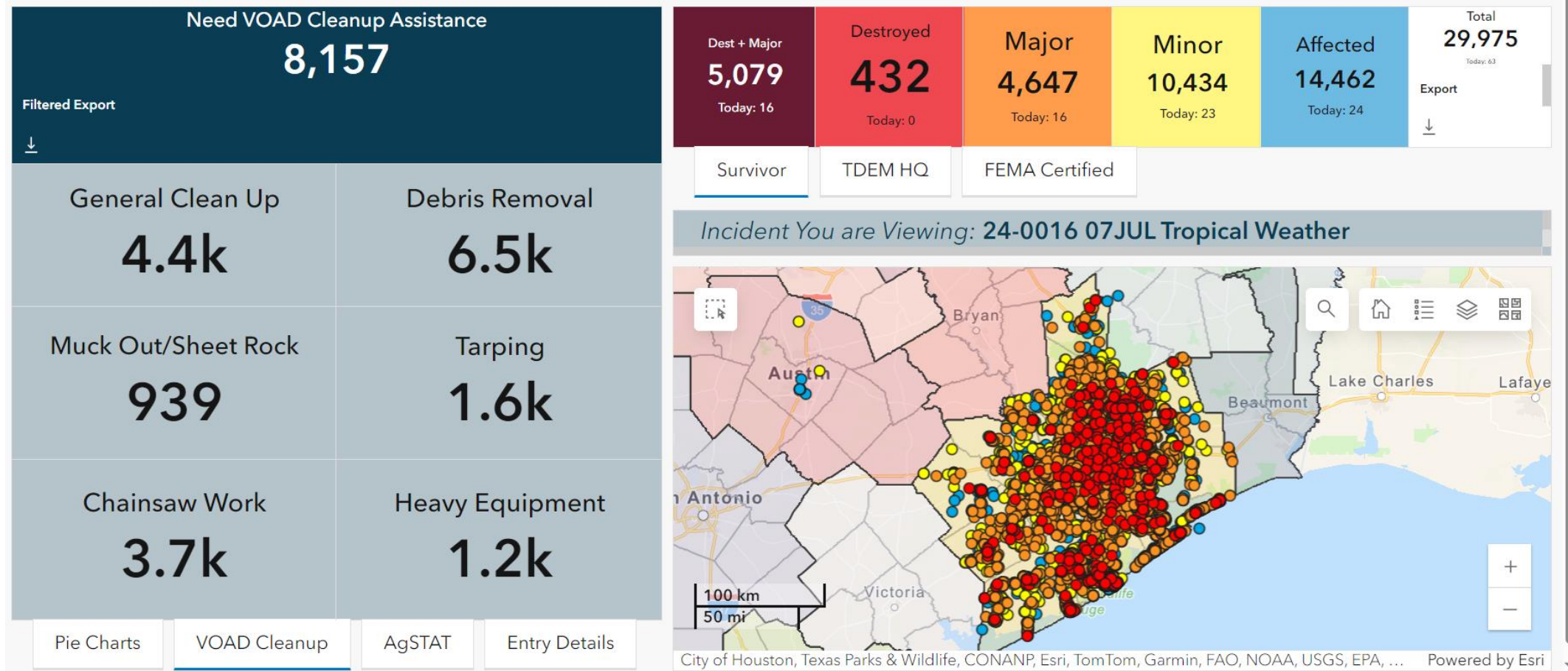

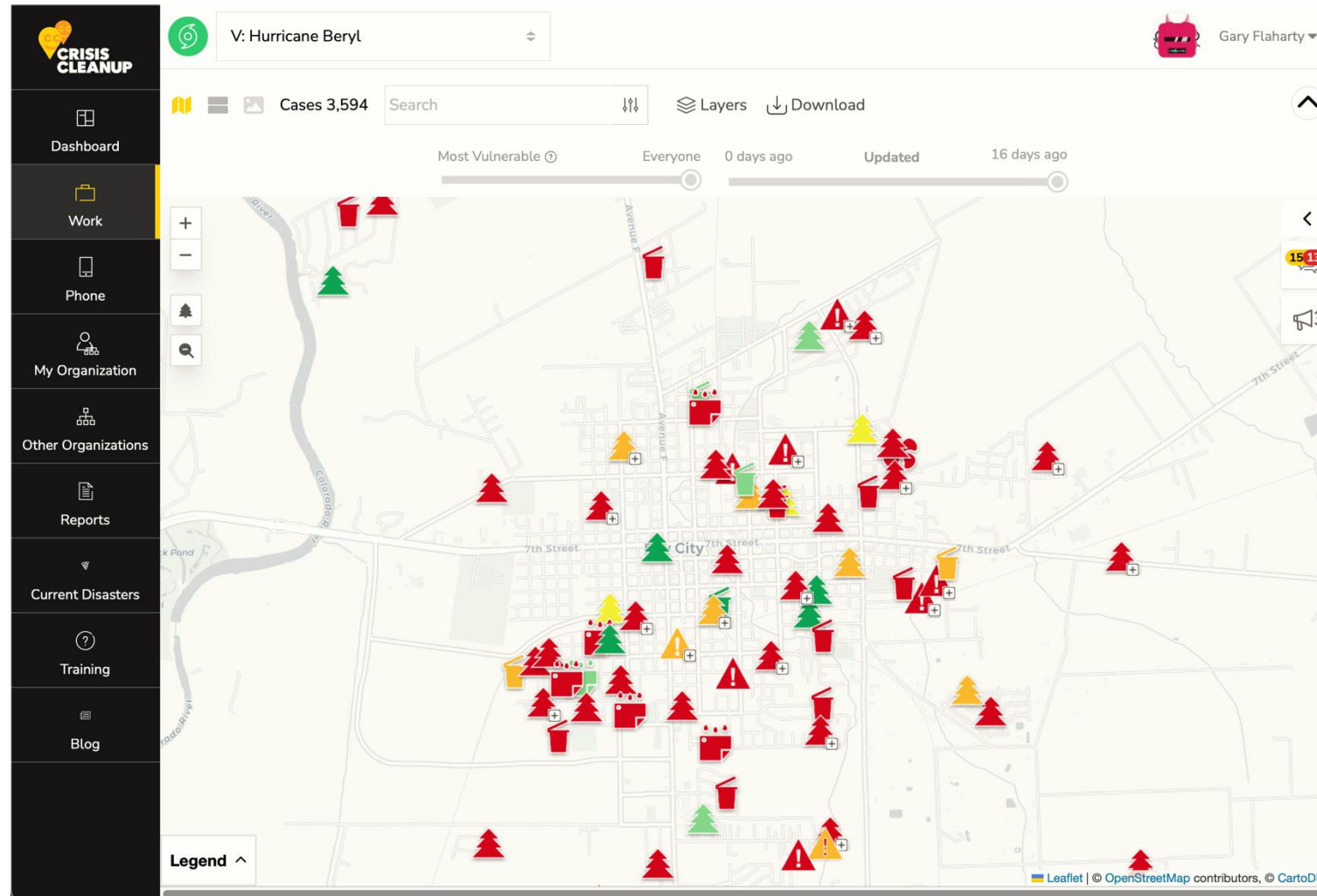

Damage Assessment

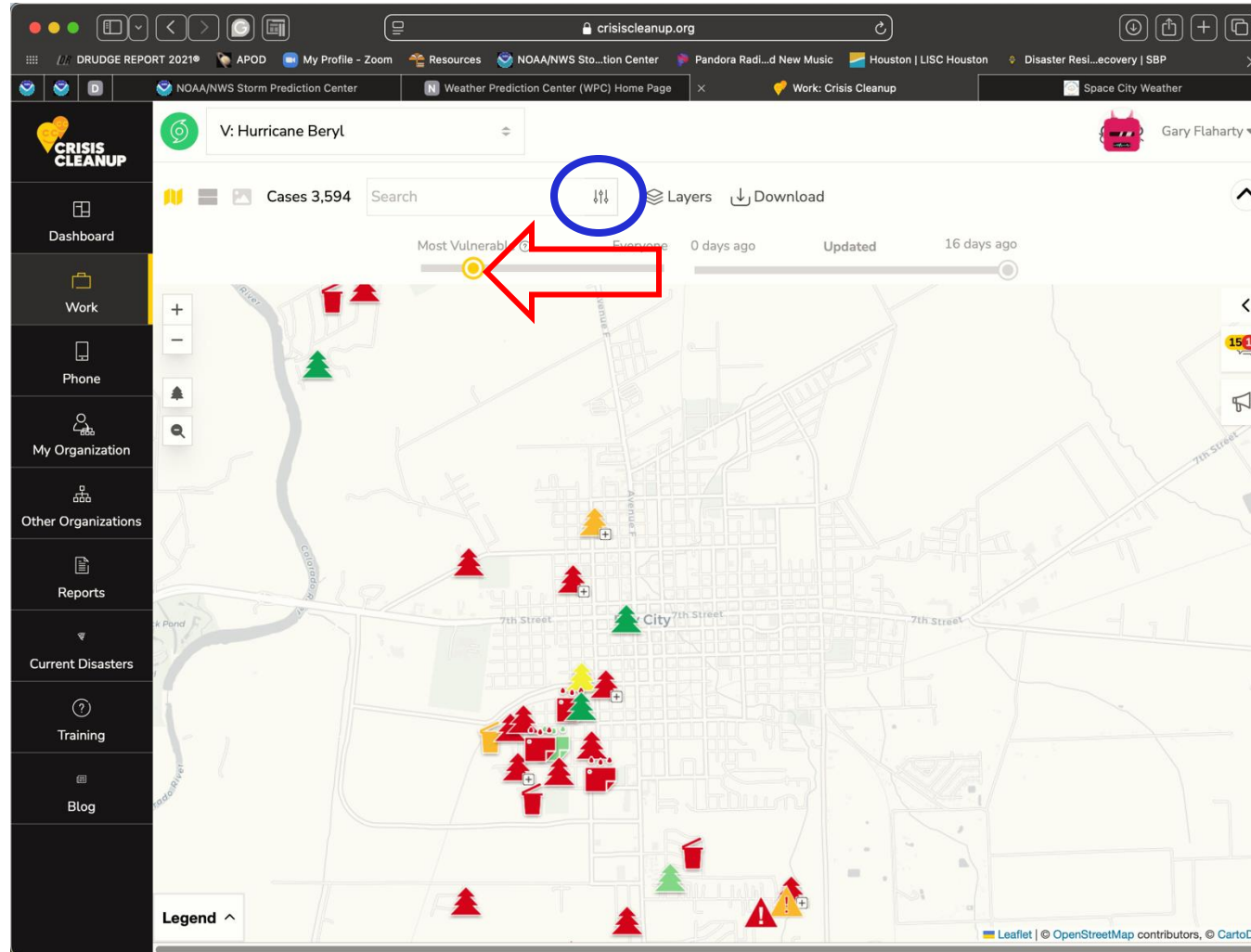


Crisis Cleanup 3594 Cases (unfiltered)

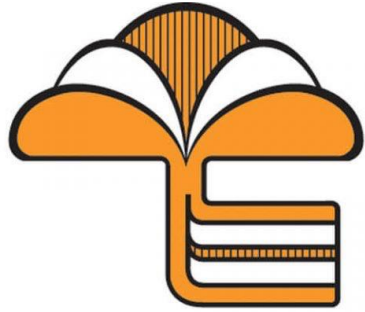
